Brazilian Embroidery 101 Step 2 presented by "Sunshine" of JDR Brazilian Elegance Step 2 Basic Brazilian Embroidery Supplies

You MUST have the correct supplies to make this an enjoyable stitching experience.

Gather together what you have – order what you need. I hate to have a "commercial" area – but if you can't get the supplies – how can you stitch? If you have a problem with a stitching technique – it is may be because you are not using the proper supplies.

Milliners Needles – Size 1,3,5,7 and a #16 or #18 Darner

N800 JDR-BE Needle Assortment 3 each (#1,3,5,7) & 2 Darner (\$1.50)

You can get N869 Colonial 14/18 Yarn Darners (7 needles) (\$1.25)

<u>Trigger/Blazer Poplin</u> – Cream or White (Cream for Beginners)

Suggested: 20" x 20" Cream or White doodle (\$1.60) (You can use denim – but it is harder to work with to start out with)

"Z" Twist Thread – EdMar or DyePot

You will need a sampling of each weight – do not worry so much about color right now unless you want your doodle cloth to become a masterpiece.

TP - Suggested to get if you have NO threads to start with or ask Sunshine to send you a "Basic Beginner pack of threads" You tell her how much you want to spend. She has some inexpensive threads (old dye lots) that are great to practice with.



Needle Threader – "Black Beauty"

NT 101 (\$.75)



Embroidery Hoop- Susan Bates 5" or less (SB4 \$2.45) I DO NOT RECOMMEND A SPRNG HOOP FOR THE BEGINNER – TOO MUCH FRUSTRATION AND IT DOES NOT HOLD YOUR FABRIC TAUNT.

Notebook for important "side trips"

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Water Soluble Marker – Marvey Pen (MP 105 \$2.25)



Scissors: Small-easy-to-handle and keep in your sewing kit.

If you are going to be flying and want to take your stitching onto the plane – I recommend the <u>Thread Cutter pendant</u>.



Another item that will help, especially the beginner, is "needle pullers" or "<u>needle grabbers</u>". Some people have gotten those "free give aways" from their banks or real estate companies that are for opening your canning jars and then cut them into disks. A rubber balloon works also. These are used when you are new and tend to wrap your bullions to tight.



Another item that helps - later stitches- is a tomato pincushion or a "drizzle pin cushion".



If your eye site is bad – get some cheater reading glasses or "Mag-Eyes".


Get a good light source that can give you lighting without a lot of shadows.

You will need **all** of the **Bold** items for any of the classes/tutorials. If you already have them – great!

Some stitchers like to get started right away with their "design".

I believe when a beginner just starts - it is important to begin a proper doodle cloth.



The doodlecloth will "some day" become a design.

I started my doodlecloth as a heart. My second doodlecloth was a large S for Sunshine.

Look in the next pages at my finished doodlecloths. I suggest that you begin by putting your initials or an oval or a heart or some favorite shape on your doodle cloth with a water-soluble marker. <u>Do NOT</u> use ink pens, graphite pencils or air erasable pens.

Leave at least 4 inches around the edge. Make the drawing big enough to accommodate at least 20 flowers – so take up almost all of the space with your drawing (but the 4 inches around the edge).

And for goodness sakes – don't try to make it absolutely perfect! We are going to be stitching over it anyway!

There will be a "class list" of supplies for the actual projects.

I bet you think we will never get stitching!

<u>Homework:</u> Practice playing the piano in the air. Wave to the crowd. Take 3 deep breaths regularly.

Don't start stitching until I tell you to.
